




Booster Doses for the Public Coming Soon – October 27, 2021

Yesterday, Provincial Health Officer Dr. Bonnie Henry announced British Columbia's booster dose immunization plan for targeted groups and the general population; it will be rolled out in a similar priority order as first and second doses of COVID-19 vaccine were. During the final months of 2021, invitations to book booster doses will be sent to health-care workers who were immunized early in the dose 1 campaign, and with shorter intervals between doses — as well as people over age 70, and Indigenous people aged 12 and up. Starting in January, people in BC who had their second dose at least 6 months earlier, including health-care workers, will get an invitation to book a booster dose. As with Dose 1 and 2, people who are registered with the Get Vaccinated System will receive an invitation to book their booster shot when it is their turn. If you received your first dose early last year, prior to the implementation of the ImmunizeBC Get Vaccinated platform, you must register yourself in order to receive notification of when you will be able to book your booster dose. Health authorities will once again schedule whole-of-community immunization clinics in collaboration with the First Nation Health Authority (FNHA), where appropriate to provide boosters to rural and remote and Indigenous communities. Indigenous Peoples in urban settings will also be offered vaccines through health authority clinics, pharmacies or in their local communities with assistance from FNHA.



As a reminder, <u>according to the BCCDC</u>, "physical distancing or maintaining a distance of two metres between two or more people is no longer required, and capacity limits for higher occupancy waiting rooms/areas are no longer required." The Province of BC is beginning to say the phrase "use a respectful distance" which can be different for individuals based on cultural norms and personal preferences. In addition, clinics are no longer required to have a COVID-19 safety site plan, and are instead required to have and use a communicable disease plan according to WorkSafeBC.
