The Aboriginal Liaison Nurse (ALN) provides support to Aboriginal people who are in hospital. (Royal Jubilee or Victoria General Hospitals).

The ALN can:

- contribute to the delivery of culturally safe care for Aboriginal patients and their families.
- clarify patient and family expectations and act as a patient advocate.
- work with Non-Insured Health Benefits (NIHB), First Nations Health Authority (FNHA) Nuu-Chah-Nulth Tribal Council (NTC) and Inter-Tribal Health Authority (ITHA) as needed.
- connect people with community services; explain health care issues.
- refer patients with Pastoral Care if requested.
- assist with discharge planning.

The Aboriginal Health Dietitian provides services to the nine First Nations communities and the urban Aboriginal population in Southern Vancouver Island. The Dietitian can:

- provide nutrition information with a strong focus on food security
- support communities as they improve access to health, traditional and modern foods
- link communities with Island Health services; and provide diabetes prevention and education workshops.

The Diabetes Nurse Educator provides outreach services to the South Island Aboriginal communities. The diabetes nurse can:

- teach you and your family about diabetes prevention; support people on how to stay healthy with diabetes; and provide education around diabetes management (how to stay healthy with diabetes, blood sugar, monitoring medication and insulin management).

All Nations' Healing Room (ANHR) Royal Jubilee - Patient Care Centre

The All Nations' Healing room was designed, based on input from Elders, to provide a culturally safe, quiet and peaceful space within the Patient Care Center that is welcoming and open to Aboriginal people. This room offers space where Aboriginal people can perform traditional healing practices or ceremonies while in hospital such as smudging, cleansing and singing. The doors and walls of the room display carvings designed by local Coast Salish artists Charles Elliott and Doug LaFortune, also a painting recently donated in SEP, 2012 by the late Métis artist Frank Lewis.

Our Services

- Pregnancy and post-natal information
- Primary health care
- Drug and alcohol counselling
- Parenting support and advocacy
- Infant and child services (breastfeeding support, immunizations, development and dental hygiene)
- Support around current and past abuse and trauma
- Nutrition (meals provided at groups, nutrition information and prenatal vitamins)
- Information and advocacy around accessing housing, income assistance, legal advice, employment and training
- Outreach and accompaniments

General Information

- We work with women who are pregnant or whose babies are under 6 months old at time of intake
- Once connected, a woman can remain with the program until her youngest child reaches 3 years old
- There is no age limit for mothers to register
- Services are provided through groups at HerWay Home and through community outreach

Aboriginal Health Outreach Workers

Can help you access health services, assist the Aboriginal Liaison Nurse (ALN) to advocate on your behalf, access Non-insurance Health Benefits (NIHB) for services, equipment and medications, help you arrange transportation to appointments for those with mobility issues and share information and education on health issues and concerns.

Addictions Counsellor

This person provides the following assistance:

- One-on-one counseling for addictions issues
- support and referral services
- extensive knowledge of the twelve step program
- knowledge of the impact of the effects of Residential School.
- provide a minimum of six visits prior to referral to a Residential Treatment Centre

Half-Time Addictions Counselor

Offers ongoing support in all stages of change, one-on-one counseling for addiction issues and assists with setting up appropriate referrals.

Mental Health Liaison

Community awareness on mental health, materials for education on mental health, referrals to appropriate care providers, support for you and your family, advocacy in dealing with representatives in the mental health system.

Community Rehabilitation

The community rehabilitation team provides occupational and physical therapy services to people in their own homes or community settings.

The team can:

- help with safe bathing techniques and equipment.
- assess needs for walking aids such as walkers and canes.
- recommend and prescribe wheelchairs.
- recommend home renovations for health and safety reasons to Band Councils.
- assess needs for kitchen, dressing aids and physical therapy i.e. education and exercise.

Dental Services

Island Health provides free dental services for children and for persons with developmental disabilities.

These services include:

- checking young children for tooth decay.
- teaching some pre-school, kindergarten and new parent groups about dental hygiene.
- helping parents and caregivers find dentists and funding for dental care for persons with developmental disabilities.
- teaching people with developmental disabilities and their caregivers about daily mouth care.

Hearing Services

This program provides the following free hearing services to children and eligible adults:

- hearing tests, fitting and repair of hearing aids; screening programs for babies and young children; support and special equipment for children with hearing loss; and support groups for families of children with hearing loss.

Home Care Dietitian

South Island clients who are housebound can access this service.

This may include:

- Malnutrition, swallowing impairment, tube feeding, wound healing, palliative care, gastro-intestinal disorders, and chronic health conditions.

For those who are having home care services a dietitian is available through central intake at 250-388-2273.

Home Care Nursing

Nurses help manage your care at home by providing:

- Assessments, education, counseling and medical/surgical care.

You may be referred to a nursing clinic at your local Home Health office. Clinic services include:

- Skin and wound care, end-of-life/palliative care, medication management, cardiac health, post-surgical/hospital care, pain management, intravenous care, chronic disease management, and ostomy care.

Home Support

This program provides assistance to people who have chronic and progressive illnesses so that they can continue to live safely in their own homes.

The community health workers can assist with: bathing, dressing and personal care.

When you need more help, the Home and Community Care Case Managers (HCC) can talk to you about what options are available.

Palliative Care

This program provides end of life care for patients, while also helping to support the emotional needs of their family members.

Services include:

- professional medical care for people in their own homes, on and off the reserve (this includes care from doctors, nurses, counselors, home support workers and the Victoria Hospice 24-hour crisis team)
- pain and symptom control, emotional and spiritual support.
- arrangements and support for in-hospital care at the Saanich Peninsula Hospital, Victoria Hospice Unit or the Royal Jubilee Hospital.

Residential Care

All clients approved for residential care (24 hr care in a facility) are charged a monthly rate based on 80% of after tax income.

Assertive Community Treatment (ACT)

The ACT teams work with clients who have complex medical, psychiatric and social care needs, who may have difficulty accessing community mental health and addictions services. Admission criteria include:

- Psychotic disorder or severe mood disorder or other issues such as cognitive impairment, severe substance use disorder requiring a coordinated treatment approach.
- Inability to consistently perform the range of daily activities required for basic community functioning.
- High use of hospital and emergency services.
- Prolonged inability to meet basic survival needs - residing in substandard housing, homeless or at imminent risk of being homeless.
- Residing in inpatient or supervised residence but able to live in more independent setting if intensive services are provided.
- Difficulty effectively utilizing traditional off-based out-patient services.
- High medical needs.

The MNGV is recognized by the Métis Nation of BC as the local for the Capital Regional District. This local covers the Gulf Islands, West Shore Communities and Port Renfrew to the Saanich Peninsula.

The purpose of the MNGV is to do all things necessary to represent the interests of the Métis people in Greater Victoria, including but not limited to:

- Re-establishing and strengthening family and community ties
- Working toward the elimination of barriers to freedom of travel and commerce
- Providing a forum for an expression of Métis consciousness in the territory
- Promoting public and governmental awareness of the goals and aspirations of the Métis people

In May, 2006 the Métis Nation of British Columbia signed a historic Métis Nation Relationship Accord with the Province of British Columbia. The Accord committed both the Métis Nation BC and the Province of BC to close the gap between Métis Citizens in this province and other British Columbians in six key areas:

- Health (Community, Family, and Individual)
- Housing
- Education (Life-long Learning)
- Economic Opportunities
- Collaborative Renewal of the Tripartite Processes
- Métis Identification and Data Collection

In response to the Accord the Métis Nation of BC established a planning process to address how the Métis Nation itself was going to make the Accord meaningful for Métis Citizens. As part of the process it was determined that the collection of data from Métis Citizens to provide baseline information for our objectives was necessary.

Diabetes Education Centre (DEC) Royal Jubilee Hospital (RJH)

The Diabetes Education Centre provides education and support to adults (age 18+) who have Diabetes or Pre-diabetes.

Education is offered in the form of groups and individual appointments for:

- people with newly diagnosed Diabetes or Pre-diabetes.
- those who need ongoing support and follow-up.

Initial entry to the program is by referral from a physician or health care professional. The family physician remains responsible for medical care of the patient.

- prenatal teaching and support.
- follow-up with new moms, their babies and families.
- support for moms who are breast-feeding.
- parenting skills; school health programs for pre-school and school aged children.
- immunizations for all ages.
- nursing support for children with special needs (birth to 19 years).
- help with finding stop smoking programs for women who are pregnant or who have children.

Public nurses also provide some on-reserve services. Check with the Health Unit in your area.

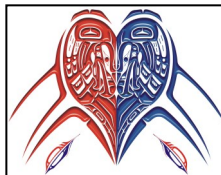
